One of the traditions our congregation, and most congregations, observe for Easter is decorating the sanctuary with Easter Lilies. As Easter has been seemingly fast approaching, and as we have made available the opportunity for members of the church to provide a lily for Easter morning, the question came to my mind, "Where did this tradition come from?"

So, I attempted to do a little research as to the origins of churches decorating the sanctuary with lilies on Easter morning. And as with many traditions, both religious and secular, it can be challenging to get to the bottom of it all, as there are many claims and legends about origins, symbolism, etc. But about the closest I could get to a consistent answer regarding the origins of the Easter Lily is something like this:

The Easter Lily was originally bought into the United States by a World War I soldier Louis Houghton. What was previously known as the Bermuda lily was first brought to the southern coast of Oregon in 1919. And the tradition of decorating churches with the flower for Easter is symbolic in nature. The bulb of these flowers buried in the ground represents the tomb of Jesus, and the glorious white trumpet-like fragrant flowers which grow from the bulbs symbolize His life after death. The snowy white color stands for the purity of the Divine Savior and the joy of the resurrection, while the trumpet shape signifies Gabriel's trumpet call to rebirth and new life.

Holy Week is approaching, and I want to encourage you to not only come celebrate the resurrection in the sanctuary decorated with lilies on Easter morning, but to also come worship the Lord throughout the week at the following times:

While on the road to Cap Haitien the other day, riding in a taptap boasting the words "Ede'm Senye" (Help me Lord) on the windshield, another taptap windshield touted the scripture reference 1 Pierre (Peter) 4:7. Conveniently using a phone bible app right then and there, the words were instantly penetrating...

The end of all things is near so take nothing for granted. Be alert and wide awake so that you may pray. Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins. Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling. Be generous with whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. If anyone speaks, they should speak the very words of God. If anyone serves, they should do so with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ. To him be the glory and the power for ever and ever. Amen.

It is direct. It is clear. It is a command. It is instruction with which we are to take action, now. The words also indicate what the results will be when the action is carried out. God will be glorified!

There have been many reminders to "Take nothing for granted". God has been glorified as Many Hands for Haiti has been hosting mission teams and going out into the countryside loving families in various ways.

We came with a gift of rice, beans, oil, spaghetti, and boullion but we received a bigger gift of inspiration and encouragement from this incredible man. The belongings in the house were a rickety chair, a wash tub, and a bed made of wooden slats with a few rags piled on which to sleep.

The man knows Jesus as his Savior. As we asked about his life and he said, "I have no problems." We talked more about the hardships he is facing. Again he said, "I have no problems."

As we proclaim, "Christ is risen, He is risen, indeed", this Easter season, we have a great opportunity to celebrate Easter and to celebrate our stewardship.

Why? Easter is a time to reflect on what God has given us. It's a tremendous opportunity to respond to God's greatest gift, his Son, who died on a cross for our sake – yours and mine – for the forgiveness of sins and the gift of everlasting life.

Think about the stories in the Bible and how God has given and given and given. The Creation Story, Noah and the Flood, the Ten Commandments, the Birth Narrative of Jesus and the Woman at the Well are among a few of these Biblical depictions of God giving to us throughout the generations.

We have the responsibility and an opportunity during this season of Easter to remind people that we are called to share with God by sharing with one another the bounty of God's gifts in our own lives.

However, consider what God might be calling you to give. We usually think in monetary terms — our tithes and offerings. But God might be calling you to spend more time with your children. God might be calling you to renew your spiritual well-being through Bible study or a retreat. God might be calling you to serve at Hope Lutheran. God might be calling you to invite a friend to church, or to volunteer to help kids or single parent families or to consider a major financial gift, or to reach out to a friend.

If you're not sure where your opportunity lies, stay alert! I'm confident that an opportunity to be a steward in the name of the One who died for us will arise along your Easter journey.

And Easter is not a journey of a single day. We celebrate 50 days of Easter. It's a time to re-evaluate how faith in the Risen Lord informs every aspect of our lives — how we labor, how we play, the way we pray, how we allocate our resources, where we spend our time, how we live, how we extend our compassion to others.

You never know where life will take you, how one opportunity or one decision will change the course you are on. When Jesus says, "follow me", he is offering us the chance of a lifetime.

On Easter morning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to the tomb and were greeted by an angel who told them, "... Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.'"

Where will we see Jesus this day? We will see him in the breaking of the bread, we will see him in the faces of our brothers and sisters, but most of all, we will see him when we, like the Marys, go from place to place to tell others that our Lord is risen indeed!

The resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ, is the victory of life over death, light over darkness, good over evil. Without the resurrection, the cross and its suffering make no sense. Easter reveals to us the power of God and the source of our faith and hope.

Easter is a time to reflect on what God has given us – his only Son. Stewards are Easter people who live in the light of Christ's resurrection. Through our daily lives we experience the peace and strength of the risen Christ. During this Easter season, consider your stewardship and consider the ways you can proclaim Christ's victory to others.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!
