TIDINGS OF HOPE lutheran church

While on our annual August trip to watch tennis in Cincinnati, Kara and I took a side-trip this year to Williamstown, Kentucky to visit what is called The Ark Encounter. If you aren't familiar with this, it is a life-size, to-biblical-scale replica of Noah's Ark, filled with exhibits that tell the story and displays that help the visitor imagine what it might have been like on the ark centuries ago. It is an enormous structure that, in numerous ways, is quite striking. Describing the entire experience for you in just a brief article would be impossible, so I will simply share with you a few highlights.



First, I was struck by the detail. The attention the creators of the attraction paid to even the most minute of details was impressive. From the dimensions of the structure, to the charts and lists of the various creatures that would have been on board, to the appearances of the displays, it was all crafted with incredible care. And the passion of those who worked on this project for both preserving the story, and bringing it to life for the world, is highly evident. There were numerous times that a small, but significant detail from the story was presented, and I found myself saying, "Oh



yeah, I forgot about that part!" And this is good, for it shows how this project is rooted in presenting biblical truth, not leaving anything out. And while there were times they used artistic license and added in a few things to help spark the imagination, it was indicated where they did so, and it was done not to add to scripture, but to more deeply engage people in the experience of the event.



Second, I was struck by the experience of plausibility. There are many in the world, and even some in the church, who would suggest that Noah's Ark, while being a great story, is totally fictitious, for it would be impossible for everything outlined in those chapters of Genesis to actually happen. But as we went through the exhibit, I found it easier than ever for my mind to put doubts and skeptical questions aside, and see that there's no reason why the events couldn't have happened as detailed in scripture. As the exhibit pointed out, great structures such as the pyramids in Egypt were constructed using primitive methods and tools, so why not an ark as well? And seeing it presented in this to-scale format - how

all the cages, the animals, the food and water storage, and everything else could certainly fit and work together in this one structure - was also quite affirming of the biblical narrative. And finally, many in the church who are skeptical

of the plausibility of Noah's Ark still believe in the resurrection of Christ. But when you think about it, which one of those events, from strictly a human or worldly point of view, is less likely? Would it not be a man raised from the dead? The reality is, both events are testified in scripture, and both events are, by the power of the Almighty One, trustworthy and true.



And finally, through this exhibit, I was struck by God's grace. After the great flood, the Lord said in Genesis 8:21-22, "Never again will I curse the ground because of human beings, even though every inclination of the human heart is evil from childhood. And never again will I destroy all living creatures, as I have done. As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease." Because of sin and rebellion, God could have destroyed everything, including Noah, his family and all creation. But God preserved and renewed what was created instead of ending it all. That is amazing grace!

So, if you find yourself in Kentucky, I would recommend taking in the experience of The Ark Encounter. But if you don't ever make it there, may you all continue to be blessed by the testimony of scripture to the truly amazing grace of our truly amazing God! In Christ, Pastor Dan

RELIEF ITEMS FOR HURRICANE HARVEY

Flood Bucket Kit: Cleaning Kit Materials

- 1 5-Gallon bucket with resealable lid. Buckets from fast-food restaurants or bakeries can be used if washed and cleaned. Do not use buckets that have stored chemicals such as paint or pool cleaner. Advertisements on the outside are acceptable
- Liquid laundry detergent. One 50-oz. or two 25-oz. bottle(s) only
- Liquid household cleaner 12-16 oz. liquid cleaner that can be mixed with water (Or two smaller bottles equally approx. 12-16 oz.) No spray cleaners
- Dish soap 16-28 oz. bottle, any brand
- 50 Clothespins
- Clothesline. One 100-ft. or two 50-ft. lines. Cotton or plastic
- 7 Sponges. No cellulose sponges due to mold issues Remove from packaging
- 24-Roll heavy-duty trash bags 33-45 gallon sizes Remove from the box
- 18 Cleaning wipes, Handi-wipes or reusable wipes. No terry cleaning towels Remove from packaging
- 1 Can air freshener Aerosol or pump
- 1 Insect-repellant spray, 6-14 oz. aerosol or spray pump with protective cover
- 2 Pairs kitchen dishwashing gloves. Should be durable enough for multiple uses. Remove from packaging
- 1 Pair work gloves All Cotton, All Leather, Cotton with Leather Palm
- 5 Scouring pads. Remove from wrapper. No stainless steel, Brillo or SOS pads (nothing with soap built in)
- 1 Scrub brush, Plastic or wood handle
- 5 Dust masks

Important Notes

- All items must be new except for the actual bucket and lid.
- All cleaning agents must be liquid and in plastic containers. No powders, please.
- If you cannot find the requested size of a liquid item, use a smaller size. Including larger sizes of any item will prevent the lid from sealing.

If Completing a Bucket: Assembly Directions

Place all liquid items in the bucket first. Place remaining items in the bucket fitting them around and between liquid items. Sponges, scouring pads, clothespins and trash bags can be separated in order to fit all items in the bucket. Ensure lid is closed securely. If all items on the list are not included, put a label on the bucket indicating what has been omitted.

1 comb- 6 inches of longer

1 metal nail file or nail clippers

1 bath-size soap- 3 oz. or larger - NO IVORY OR JERGENS

1 toothbrush - Adult size only

MISSION MEMO

We received an email after donation from Hope to the ministry in Nicaragua, 516, that Tom Goeken has been working with.

Just opened your letter with donation for the work in San Rafael del Norte. What a wonderful encouragement and further sign of God's hand on this move. Thank you!! Thought you'd like to hear some of the other indications that this is God's intent for us and our team in Nicaragua:

- \cdot Last July 31 we started a radio program called THE PASTORAL VOICE. Jaime is travelling every Monday to do the show. Local pastors will have a day to share.
- · Jacqueline (Jaime's wife) presented a business opportunity in San Rafael with ORIFLAME COMPANY. This is very important as the unemployment rate is high nothing is reported officially, but it is probably in the range of 50%.
- · Jaime will be teaching a leadership conference to all the churches leaders in San Rafael.
- · The local pastoral association agreed to fix the roof of the police department and paint it. We will collect money in the local churches. This is huge on two fronts getting local churches to move outside their walls and for them to donate money. Both are major shifts in attitude for Nicaraguan churches.
- \cdot A church in Miami (through a friend of Jaime's) wants to support the effort in San Rafael. They want to explore starting

a new church. They are also willing to donate to build a small clinic needed by a small village nearby.

- · Pastor Miguel (Assembly of God) said that his church never was so full in 10 years as when 516 lead an evangelical crusade there.
- · Pastor Francisco (Baptist) said that he was totally in shock when he see his mother-in-law at church for the first time.
- · The Assembly of God worship team from Palacaguina came with a team from 516 for 3 days. The people of San Rafael connected with them very deeply.
- \cdot Resurrection church (516's home church in Palacaguina) stayed for 3 days, because the first day the bus broke.
- · A team of Gideons from Estelí (an hour away) drove every day. The day donate New Testaments, 5 brothers come to faith every day. The team was quite touched by their example.
- Every day at least 5 people from every church and local pastor stay with us full time.
- · In total, 1500 New Testaments have been given out.
- \cdot In the initial work in the community 33 new professions of faith.

We are so excited to being working in this beautiful community. We believe that prior to starting work there in early July, there were about 100 Christians in the town. So the addition of 33 new believers is a massive growth and indicative of the spiritual hunger of the people there.

Sowing Seeds of Stewardship John W. Jensen

It's that time of year. The days are getting shorter which explains why it is now dark when I get up in the morning. The coolness of the morning makes us think of - Clay County Fair Time! Which means that fall and the harvest are not far behind.

Here's some verses from 2 Corinthians Chapter 9 that relate to the harvest and God's abundance: "whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously" (verse 6), "Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (verse 7) and "God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work" (verse 8).

If you weren't a fan of context you could take these as fuel to fire a prosperity gospel. After all, if we give a big enough offering with a big enough smile we'll surely end up with a whopping great blessing on our lives, right?

Sadly, that's not quite what Paul has in mind, but the passage is still dynamite when it comes to the subject of our giving.

Paul's right when he says that we reap what we sow, but we should remember that Paul's using the agricultural term metaphorically here, and so we are not meant to take the words literally. Paul is talking about where our choices are motivated by our heart rather than our wallet. Each of us should give "what he has decided in his heart to give". That decision about how much to give should be reached after careful consideration, and always with joy and cheerfulness.'

These passages from 2 Corinthians Chapter 9 could be linked to Paul's earlier letter to the Corinthians where he encourages planned, systematic giving (1 Corinthians 16:1-3). While there's nothing wrong with spontaneous, Spirit-prompted acts of generosity, we primarily need to approach the matter with care, prayer and time.

Decisions about what, and how, we give should not be left to spur-of-the-moment emotions, just as a harvest cannot be reaped when the farmer feels 'in the mood'.

Harvests, like generosity, take time, purposeful planning and an eye for the long game. As well as making us more efficient in our giving, this also allows for a greater connection with God through the process. As Paul says, "This service that you perform is not only supplying the needs of the Lord's people but is also overflowing in many expressions of thanks to God." (verse 12)

We 21st century Christians have such potential. The internet and world-wide communications gives us the power to become informed about so many areas of need in the world, and the possibility to plan our giving in ways that make a sustained, effective difference right where we feel God is calling us. We have the opportunity to share our abundance, not only around the world but also in our own backyard through the Hope Lutheran Food Bank.

Here's how you can help the Food Bank:

- 1) Offer up prayers of thanksgiving for the Food Bank, the workers, and those receiving the supplies.
- 2) Volunteer to spend some time working at the Food Bank.
- 3) Provide an offering to help finance the Food Bank or go on a grocery shopping spree. You can give a special offering for the Food Bank just indicate on your check or offering envelope that is where you want the funds to go. At the present time, we are assisting about a dozen family units. We are spending \$300-400 per month keeping the Food Bank stocked.
- 4) Help spread the word that assistance is available to those in need.

The harvest season is fast approaching. Now is the time to plan how you will share your abundance in your tithes and offerings, your time and talents. Praise be to God!
